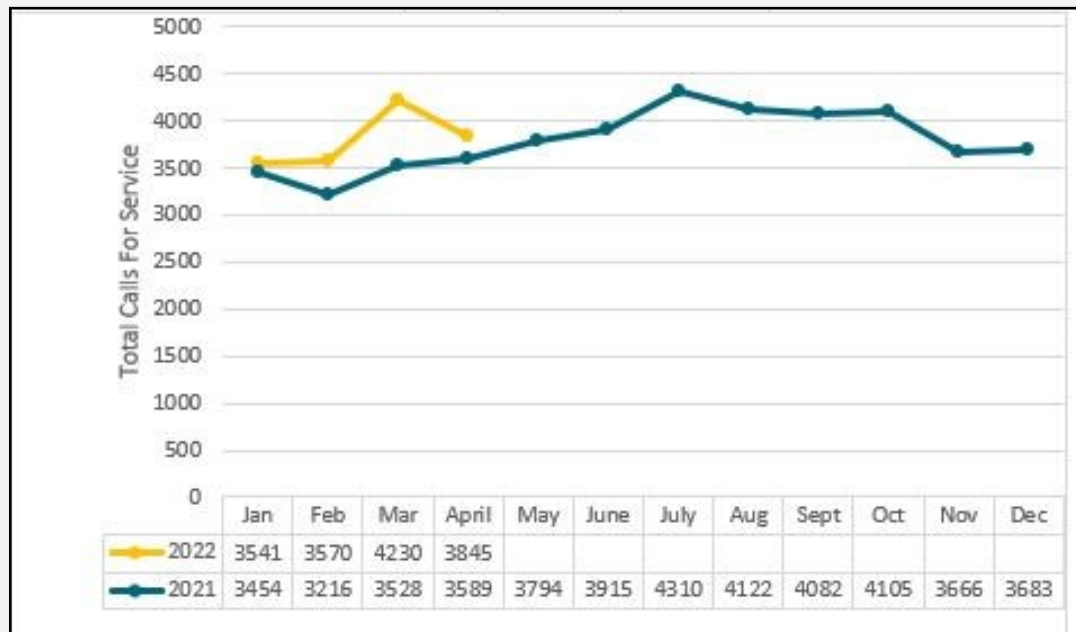

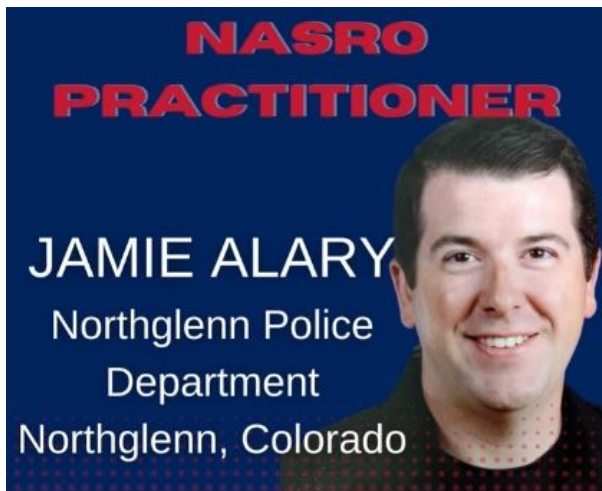

Chief Talk:

A Quarterly Message from Police Chief Jim May

Over the past several years the Northglenn Police Department has paid increasing attention to the role law enforcement plays in victim support and recovery. As first responders, we recognize officers are often a victim's first point of contact with the criminal justice system. As such, these interactions can have a long-lasting impact, specifically for victims of a traumatic-natured crime.

By refining internal victim-related policies and implementing a trauma-informed, victim-centered approach, our agency empowers victims to tell their stories in a meaningful way, while respecting their dignity.

Detectives are trained to have a greater understanding of the effects of human trauma, and how that translates into the investigation, as well as the need to engage Victim Services in the initial stages of the investigation. Victim Services is the essential component connecting victims to appropriate community services and support and providing guidance to navigate through the criminal justice system.

Victimization does not end when the crime or criminal proceedings end. The journey to healing and recovery often requires a continuum of services and support beyond the capacity of law enforcement. There are several resources that aim to increase awareness and support victims of child abuse, domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

Project Updates

The temporary Housing Program has averted a total of 1,857 nights of homelessness, 1,742 of these nights were averted for people who entered the full-time program. There has been 52 full-time participants and 9 have exited into housing from the housing program.

The CRU has also helped two individuals reunite with their family members across the United States in the month of April as well as assisted 3 individuals obtain permanent housing who were not part of the Temporary Housing Program.

Community Concerns

Adams County is reporting that there have been zero deaths due to hypothermia this year. This is most likely due in part to life saving programs such as SWAP and the Winter Housing Program.
