


#### **SWAT**

#### **Project Updates**

The Winter Housing Program will need a new name now that is has been extended! Through March 31, 2022, the program has averted 1,465 nights of unsheltered homelessness. Two guests of the WHP obtained permanent housing in the month of March. As a bonus one person, who has been living out of their car for four years, also moved into their permanent housing.

#### **Community Concerns**

CRU is putting plans into place to keep the old rec. center from becoming a gathering place as the weather warms.

#### **Anticipated Community Questions**

Question: Is the Winter Housing Program being extended?

Answer: Yes, the program has been extended through August 31, 2022.
