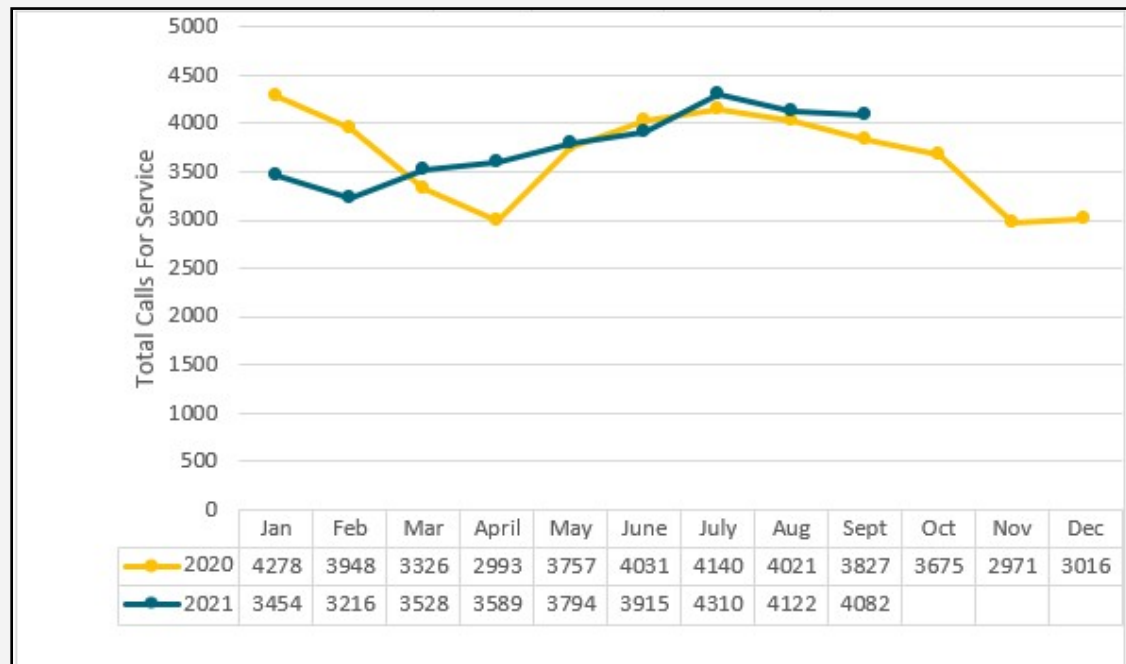

School Resource Officers Conduct Lock-Down Drills

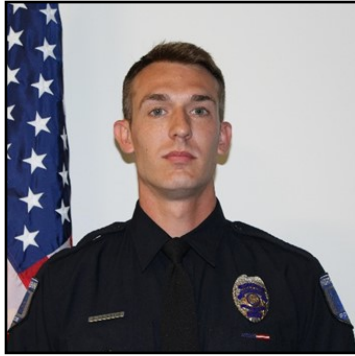
