Upon completion of the POST Academy newly hired officers enter a four to six week in-service academy which includes, among other training, Defensive Tactics and Arrest Control (DTAC). This training focuses on arrest control techniques and developing skills that allow officers to protect themselves as well as protect third parties.

- De-escalation of force
- Use of less lethal weapon systems
- Alternatives to the use of deadly force
- Searching and handcuffing
- Proper holds and restraints
- Control techniques
- Ground tactics and defense
- Impact weapons
- Crisis Intervention training
- Self-Defense

Detective Jackie Spresser's Journey to the Olympics



Raised by parents who grew up in the Detroit, Michigan area, also known as "Hockey Town," Jackie learned to love hockey at an early age and played for many years. After Jackie's "competitive" playing days were over, her father introduced her to officiating.

Many years later, and with much experience, Jackie has officiated world championships in the US, Bulgaria, New Zealand, Italy, Norway, Canada, and the Czech Republic. Her passion lead her to set a goal to officiate women's hockey in the 2018 PyeongChang Olympic Winter games. In preparation, Jackie officiated many games between the USA National team and the Canadian National team in their pre-Olympic tours. Jackie spent countless hours in the gym, on the ice, and in the rule books. However, Jackie's dream would have to wait...

Fast forward to 2022. Jackie's commitment to reach her Olympic goal has finally earned her a spot with the officiating staff in the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics.

Chief Talk: A Quarterly Message from Police Chief Jim May

Northglenn is joining forces with the Colorado Metropolitan Auto Theft Task Force (CMATT) to combat the ever-increasing motor vehicle thefts in the Denver Metro area.

It is common for motor vehicle offenders to steal cars to commit other serious and dangerous crimes like robbery or burglary. Offenders are also stripping down the stolen vehicle and selling parts for a profit through what is known as "chop shops".

The partnership with CMATT is a multi-agency collaborative effort providing tools and techniques, that are not otherwise available, to address motor vehicle theft across jurisdictions. A network of law enforcement agencies, investigators, and prosecutors are working to build solid cases and hold thieves accountable for their crimes. The National Insurance Crime Bureau and the Colorado Auto Theft Prevention Authority are also partnering to make this possible by providing resources and funding. By combining efforts and resources we are multiplying forces to protect people, their property, and insurance companies.

CMATT reports the Chevrolet Silverado, Hyundai Sonata, Kia Optima, Kia Sportage, and Ford F-250 made the top five most stolen vehicles in the Denver Metro area in 2021. Northglenn has seen the same patterns of vehicles stolen and a 38% total increase, at year-end, in motor vehicle thefts in our jurisdiction from 2020 to 2021.

Safety and quality of life are a shared responsibility between the community and the police. Do your part to help keep you and your property safe by following some simple motor vehicle theft prevention tips:

- Park your vehicle in the garage and keep the garage door closed day and night
- Do not leave keys in your vehicle
- Do not leave your vehicle unlocked and unattended while it is running
- Install or use an anti-theft device
- Be a good neighbor and report any suspicious activity
- At night park in a well lit area
- In parking lots, park near the main entrance of the business.

Install of Patrol Fleet Dash Cameras is Complete

As part of Northglenn's commitment to enhancing our community policing model, an install of dash cameras in the police fleet is now complete! The dash cameras, along with body-worn cameras, operationalized in March 2021, capture video for transparency, accountability, and safety for both police and community mem-

The dash camera system has a front facing and backseat facing camera. Just like body-worn cameras have technology to automatically activate based on actions/conditions so do the dash cameras. Dash cameras are activated upon the patrol vehicle rear doors opening, the patrol vehicle reaching a certain speed, a crash, release of the patrol vehicle rifle lock, activation of overhead lights, taser activation, and when an officer removes their firearm from the holster.

Project Updates

The Winter Housing Program is well underway. To date we have had 29 full-time participants. The PD has utilized the program for 19 emergency drop-offs. No calls for safety have occurred within the program, 3 medical calls have been made. The City of Northglenn is helping organize volunteers, as there is high interest in lending a hand.

Anticipated Community Questions

Question: Can I donate items to the Winter Housing Program?

Answer: Yes, donations can be dropped off at the Old Rec Center any day after 6 p.m. when staff are on site or before 9 a.m. before staff leave.
