Neighborhood Watch Works

■ Number of Incidents on Local Street Cut in Half in Two Years

They went from 20 incidents in 2013 to nine in 2015 and only five so far this year.

How did one small neighborhood in Northglenn reduce the crime rate in their neighborhood? By having an active and committed Neighborhood Watch program.

With about 10 households in their group, the neighbors on Sherman Street are alert to any unusual activity in their neighborhood and don't hesitate to call the police. Colleen Matlock, co-chair of their Neighborhood Watch, attributes their success to vigilance.

"We call each other, we call the police, and we watch out for each other," she said.

Colleen, along with co-chair Karen Riehl, believe being determined and working together are the keys to a successful Neighborhood Watch program.

Officer Paul Skattum has worked with their group and said,





Ordinances: First Reading

Municipal Code Initially Modified

CB-1868 – Council unanimously approved on first reading an ordinance amending the Municipal Code by the addition of a new section, 9-4-14, prohibiting sitting or lying down on public sidewalks and rights-of-way in designated areas.

Increased Spending Authority for City Manager Initially Passes

CB-1869 – After discussing increasing the spending authority of the city manager from \$25,000 to \$50,000, council unanimously agreed to bring the ordinance forward.

Resolutions

Part-time Preschool Instructor Added

CR-67 – Council unanimously approved an amendment to the 2016 Budget Personnel Summary to add one part-time preschool instructor.

Improvements Project for Community Center Drive

CR-68 – In a unanimous decision, council approved a contract with Felsberg Holt Ullevig for the Community Center Drive Improvements Project in the amount of \$106,470, including a 10 percent contingency, for an approved expenditure limit of \$117,117.

Cap Raised on Pipeline Repair Expenditures

CR-69 – Council unanimously approved a change order to the agreement with C&L Water Solutions, Inc. for emergency pipeline repairs in the amount of \$33,986. This amends the agreement from an amount not to exceed \$85,000 to a total of \$118,986.


Personnel Changes in Planning Division Made

CR-70 – Council unanimously approved amending the 2016 Pay Plan by adjusting the salary range for the planning manager and reclassifying the two planner positions to senior planner.

City to Purchase Land

CR-71 – In a 7-1 vote, council approved the purchase of the property located at 421 W. 112th Ave. for the purchase price of \$420,000.

Stay Safe Heading to School

Courtesy Adams 12 Five Star Schools

This month, students will return for the new school year with classes beginning the week of Aug. 15.

More than 7,100 students are enrolled in the 13 Adams 12 Five Star schools located in Northglenn.

As students prepare for their learning, we can do our part to keep everyone safe. Studies show that students face the most risk on their way to and from school. Here are a few tips to keep our students safe:

Sharing the Road

- Watch for students crossing the road at stop lights or crosswalks and always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding a stop sign.
- Take extra care to watch for children in parks, playgrounds or in residential or school zones.
- Never pass a bus from behind if it

is loading or unloading children.

- Be careful when approaching students on bicycles, especially when turning or attempting to pass.
- If your teenage child is driving for the first year, make sure they know the rules for driving in a school zone.

Walking to School

- Teach your child to always walk on the sidewalk if available. If not, children should walk facing traffic.
- Ensure your child knows where and how to cross the street safely.

Riding Bikes to School

- Make sure your child always wears a properly fitting helmet.
- Teach your child the rules of the road: riding with traffic on the right side; stopping at traffic lights and stop signs.




May 2016 General Fund Financial Report

Figures are through the end of May




Northglenn June 2016 Crime Statistics

Outstanding Lemonade

Elementary School Student Bonneau Turns One Lemonade Stand Into Area Franchise for Youth

Note: This is the seventh in a series of stories featuring winners from the 2015 Business Appreciation Breakfast.

Two summers ago, then 8-year-old Jack Bonneau asked his father for the Lego Death Star.

"Sure," said his dad, Steve. "But you will have to earn the money." With a \$400 price tag, Jack realized a lemonade stand on his street wouldn't cut it. So he set up at a farmer's market, and in a few months his stand generated more than enough money to buy the Lego Death Star.

Plus, he also had a whole lot of fun.

For most kids, this is where the story would end. But the entrepreneurial force was strong with Jack.

He launched a franchise, Jack's Stands, so other kids could learn about entrepreneurship and financial literacy.

Two years later, Jack manages four lemonade stands in the Denver area. More than 200 kids have signed up to work. They keep the tips and receive a sales commission, with Jack taking care of supplies.

For his accomplishments, Jack has been showcased on

The city's HEAL Committee is organizing the event to encourage residents to get out and live a healthy, active lifestyle.


The fun doesn't stop once the rodeo wraps up. "The Good Dinosaur" will be showing starting at dusk as part of the city's Summer Movie Series.

Most electronics are accepted for disposal free of charge except for some televisions and monitors. Fees are \$5 for CRT-computer monitors and \$30 for CRT-tube television sets. Flat monitors and television sets are disposed free of charge.

Gather personal and sensitive documents in a box or bag and bring them in to be shredded. Shredding keeps your personal

information safe and helps prevent identity theft and fraud. Please note that medications will NOT be accepted.


